Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time 26th July 2015 Year B Psalter 1

First Reading: 2 Kings 4:42-44

A miracle of multiplication of bread is worked through the prophet Elisha and becomes more than enough to satisfy the needs of all. God, in his graciousness, provides generously for human hunger – of body and spirit.

Responsorial Psalm 144-You open wide your hand, O Lord, and grant our desires -

Second Reading: Ephesians 4:1-6

God, in his graciousness has been generous to us, and we, in turn, are to be generous in our living of the life he calls us to, especially in our efforts to build up the Christian community. Paul implores the Christians of Ephesus to lead a life worthy of their baptismal calling. We may not feel we have much to offer, but if we give from a willing heart, it will build the body of Christ to the glory of the Father.

Gospel: John 6:1-15

From today, the continuous reading of St. Mark's gospel is interrupted and instead we listen to and reflect on the sixth chapter of John's gospel, Jesus' teaching on the Bread of Life. We start with the miracle of the loaves and fishes, what seems inadequate is freely given and shared and is more than adequate to feed the crowd. In the Eucharist, we remember that Jesus offered himself for the salvation of all. He is the Bread of Life that satisfies the deepest hungers of the human heart.

RCIA stands for the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults and is for individuals from any faith background (and none) who want to explore and enquire into the catholic faith.

Laudato Si – Pope Francis' Encyclical on the Environment

The second chapter, "The Gospel of Creation", considers the world the way that God intended it. The chapter surveys the rich scriptural traditions to show that there is no biblical justification for "a tyrannical anthropocentrism unconcerned for other creatures." [68]. Likewise, there is no room for misanthropic versions of environmentalism since reverence for nature is only authentic if we have compassion for fellow humans. A person who is truly concerned about the trafficking of endangered species is automatically concerned with the trafficking of humans.

The third chapter, "The Human Roots of the Ecological Crisis", examines the twin notions of what it calls the "technocratic paradigm" and a "modern anthropocentrism" borne out of a view that sees nature as a mere given, devoid of any spiritual or transcendental value. These notions have led to the misplaced ideas that the earth's resources are infinite and that economic growth and technology alone can solve global hunger and poverty. In reality, a purely materialistic view of reality has not only resulted in disregard for the environment, but also undermined the worth of a human life, especially those forms viewed as having little or no utility – human embryos, the poor, or people with disabilities. At the heart of consumerist and profit-driven economic ideologies is a wrongfooted idea of dominion. The result is exploitation, and a throwaway attitude towards nature and human life itself. The encyclical calls for a bold cultural revolution in our attitude to development and progress. It puts it rather bluntly: "Nobody is suggesting a return to the Stone Age, but we do need to slow down and look at reality in a different way, to appropriate the positive and sustainable progress which has been made, but also to recover the values and the great goals swept away by our unrestrained delusions of grandeur."
