The Lord said to Samuel, 'Fill your horn with oil and go, I am sending you to Jesse of Bethlehem, for I have chosen myself a king among his sons.' GOSPEL John 9:1.6-9.13-17.34-38 (Shorter Form Only)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John.

As Jesus went along, he saw a man who had been blind from birth. He spat on the ground, made a paste with the spittle, put this over the eyes of the blind man and said to him, 'Go and wash in the Pool of Siloam' (a name that means 'sent'). So the blind man went off and washed himself, and came away with his sight restored.

His neighbours and people who earlier had seen him begging said, 'Isn't this the man who used to sit and beg?' Some said, 'Yes, it is the same one.' Others said, 'No, he only looks like him.' The man himself said, 'I am the man.'

They brought the man who had been blind to the Pharisees. It had been a sabbath day when Jesus made the paste and opened the man's eyes, so when the Pharisees saked him how he had come to see, he said, 'He put a paste on my eyes, and I washed, and I can see.' Then some of the Pharisees said 'This man cannot be from God: he does not keep the sabbath.' Others said, 'How could a sinner produce signs like this?' And there was disagreement among them. So they spoke to the blind man again, 'What have you to say about him yourself, now that he has opened your eyes?' 'He is a prophet' replied the man. 'Are you trying to teach us,' they replied 'and you a sinner through and through, since you were born! And they drove him away.

Jesus heard they had driven him away, and when he found him he said to him, 'Do you believe in the Son of Man?' 'Sir,' the man replied 'tell me who he is so that I may believe in him.' Jesus said, 'You are looking at him; he is speaking to you.' The man said, 'Lord, I believe', and worshipped him.

The story of the gospel today deals with the two types of sight. A man who was blind from birth was cured and then his spiritual blindness was also cured. He began to see with the eye of faith.

The eye of faith lets us see beyond the externals to the goodness inside. It lets us see past our preconceptions. We can sometimes see further with new sight.

Jesus offers this. Most of his cures point to the spiritual. The eye of faith.

When I look at a homeless person, what do I see? Do I see into the soul of the person who wants shelter and a home just like me? At the refugee who wants to be safe just like we want our loved ones to be? Can we see death as the door to new life, as Jesus sees it – dying, we will rise again!

How does God see you? First – immensely loved and loveable; able to love others; able to share his mission of love and compassion in the world. The blind man saw Jesus as the son of God; can we see others as Jesus sees them?

Jesus will say later – blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe. We pray for a strong spiritual sight.

This is good news. We are happier when our spiritual sight is strong as well. Seeing people and the world with the eyes of Jesus brings joy and freedom. It sees the goodness in everyone, the possibility of a better world, and faith in the living God.
