Christmas in St. Anne's

Christmas 2020 will be a very different Christmas for everyone. Families across the parish will not be able to celebrate in the normal way. The season of Christmas is a season of celebration, but this year it is essential that we celebrate safely.

Normally at Christmas time large numbers of people wish to attend Mass in St. Anne's. This year, however, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, our church simply cannot accommodate such crowds if we are to ensure the health and safety of all and conform to Public Health Agency guidance and NI Executive legislation.

Our Parish Covid-19 Support Team have been meeting to review our arrangements and again review the Risk Assessment.

In order to avoid the real possibility of increased transmission of the Covid-19 virus this Christmas, Christmas Masses will be ONLINE ONLY.

• Our church will be closed on Thursday 24th, Fri 25th and Sat 26th December.

Public mass will resume on Sunday 27th Dec. for 11am Mass.

Please remember:

- 1. The obligation to attend Mass in person this Christmas has been suspended.
- 2. Our Christmas Masses will be broadcast live and available online, so people are encouraged to participate in a live-streamed Mass.
- 3. People could also choose to attend Mass on one day over the Christmas season up to the Solemnity of the Epiphany, January 6th

Advent 2020

Dear St. Anne's Parishioners, At the beginning of 2020 no one could have foreseen the difficulties we would have to endure due to Covid-19. While our first thoughts must be with those who have died, and with their grieving families, we think also of the sick and elderly in our care homes and in our hospitals.

They, though admirably cared for by hard pressed medical and nursing staffs, are, nevertheless, isolated from their families. Many others have been "cocooned" in their own homes and depending on the goodwill of relatives and neighbours. At the same time, the restriction on the numbers attending our churches – while very understandable – is not without its pain. As priests, we too struggle with all of this, and experience the sadness and frustration of not being able to minister to our parishioners as we would want, yet, we continue to do what is possible in the circumstances.

The pandemic has caused a downturn in the economic situation and once healthy businesses have reduced their staff, or in some cases, closed altogether. Consequently, many families may face this Christmas with greatly reduced income. As a result, parish income is greatly reduced, as is the income of priests' welfare fund, who rely entirely on the voluntary contributions of parishioners. The priests' welfare fund has taken a significant reduction over recent months. If your circumstances permit, we ask that you please keep your priests in mind this Christmas.

The traditional Christmas collection, together with the other collections for the upkeep of priests throughout the year, is, in a spirit of priestly fraternity, "pooled" in a central fund. This fund, administered by an elected committee of priests, is shared in such a way as to ensure that every priest ministering in the Diocese receives the same level of income.

Thank you for your kind support and your constant prayers. We pray, that even in these difficult times, Christmas may be for you a time of blessing.

Today's Scripture Themes



FIRST READING

A reading from the second book of Samuel *7:1-5, 8-12, 14, 16*

Once David had settled into his house and the Lord had given him rest from all the enemies surrounding him, the king said to the prophet Nathan, 'Look, I am living in a house of cedar while the ark of God dwells in a tent'. Nathan said to the king, 'Go and do all that is in your mind, for the Lord is with you'. But that very night the word of the Lord came to Nathan: 'Go and tell my servant David, "Thus the Lord speaks: Are you the man to build me a house to dwell in?



This is what you must say to my servant David," the Lord Sabaoth says this: I took you from the pasture, from following the sheep, to be leader of my people Israel; I have been with you on all your expeditions; I have cut off all your enemies before you. I will give you fame as great as the fame of the greatest on earth. I will provide a place for my people Israel; I will plant them there and they shall dwell in that place and never be disturbed again; nor shall the wicked continue to oppress them as they did, in the days when I appointed judges over my people Israel; I will give them rest from all their enemies. the Lord will make you great; the Lord will make you a House. GOSPEL

A reading from the Gospel according to Luke 1:26-38

The angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin betrothed to a man named Joseph, of the House of David; and the virgin's name was Mary. He went in and said to her, 'Rejoice, so highly favoured! The Lord is



with you.' She was deeply disturbed by these words and asked herself what this greeting could mean, but the angel said to her, 'Mary, do not be afraid; you have won God's favour. Listen! You are to conceive and bear a son, and you must name him Jesus. He will be great and will be called Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give him the throne of his ancestor David; he will rule over the House of Jacob for ever and his reign will have no end.' Mary said to the angel, 'But how can this come about, since I am a virgin?' 'The Holy Spirit will come upon you' the angel answered 'and the power of the Most High will cover you with its shadow. And so the child will be holy and will be called Son of God. Know this too: your kinswoman Elizabeth has, in her old age, herself conceived a son, and she whom people called barren is now in her sixth month, for nothing is impossible to God' 'I am the handmaid of the Lord,' said Mary 'let what you have said be done to me.' Christmas and the coming of our hope — Father Gerry McFlynn



Father Gerry McFLynn is Project Manager of the Irish Council for Prisoners Overseas, based at the Irish Chaplaincy in London.

In this piece he reflects on 'Christmas and the coming of our hope':

In Dennis O'Driscoll's humorous poem, Non-Stop Christmas, "Christmas is always coming. There are only ever so many days still left". Well, the shopping and the frenetic activity which have characterised the past two or three months are over and we are now on the eve of the big day itself.

The great thing about Christmas, someone has said, is that it is compulsory and whether we like it or not, it does happen. However, as with Easter, this year it will be a very different Christmas, pared down and shorn of so much that has made it special in the past.

Each year it becomes more difficult to say anything refreshingly new about it and I sometimes wonder why. Maybe it has something to do with growing older. Every Christmas, my mind is drawn back to my childhood and the wonderful celebrations I experienced as part of a happy, loving family. But I'm older now and so too, sadly, is the world I live in. Maybe the magic of Christmas is only for children, after all, and very small ones at that.

The truth is that I now know too much about the real state of the world – the countless millions of people displaced through wars, famines and natural disasters, those exploited and imprisoned through poverty and neglect, to say nothing of this year's victims of the Covid-19 pandemic. In my weaker moments, I sometimes think that the

nightmares of our times are destroying us personally, collectively, physically and spiritually.

And yet it is against this stark and frightening background that we still dare, each year, to celebrate the coming of the Prince of peace with his message of love, compassion and, above all, hope. St John in his Gospel, talks about Jesus as the Light coming into a dark world, and we certainly need that light In our ever darkening world. When, back in April, I drafted my annual Easter Message for the hundreds of Irish prisoners I work with, I could never have imagined that I would be following it up with a Christmas one some eight months later. However, this year for some reason, I found it more challenging to offer them a word or two of hope, aware of how difficult it is for them, separated from their families and loved ones at the one time of the year when everything conspires to remind them of home. But hope we must.

Hope is at the very heart of the Christmas message, a hope based on the person and teaching of Jesus. Christmas is about the vulnerability of a God who chose to come among us as an infant, exposed to life's social and political circumstances as we all are. Throughout his short life, Jesus was always on the margins, in solidarity with the outcasts, the dispossessed, those without a name on the highway of life.

That's why, each Christmas, we welcome him back into our world, personally and collectively, because we desperately want to believe that somewhere in what he said and did lies the key to a life that offers hope and meaning. And after the year we've just had, we surely deserve a fresh injection of both.

Reflections by John Cullen



20 December: Fourth Sunday of Advent

'For nothing will be impossible with God.' (Luke 1:37)



Brendan Rodgers is from Ballymena, County Antrim. He is a former player and coach of several football teams in the past including as a manager for Watford, Reading, Swansea, Liverpool and Celtic. He is the present manager of Leicester Football Club. In the notes of the match programme he always signs off with his

characteristic three-word quip: 'Everything is possible'. In one message of his I read, 'I've always said that you can live without water for a few days, but you can't live a second without hope.'

A woman once said to me, 'I am living with constant tension in my home. I wait in hope for tender looks. All I have is a God who weeps.' Advent is a time to believe and hope in a God who walks in and stays with the brokenness of our lives. The Gospel is a record of how Jesus enters into the darkness, like the seed growing in the ground, like a God who weeps, so that he can be the living, real presence for others who live with the emotional, spiritual and physical brokenness.



In the Gospel, Jesus claims that he is the light that is uncontainable that

extinguishes the darkness of loneliness, rejection, alienation and indifference.

In the Greek Orthodox Liturgy, when the bread and wine have been prepared and consecrated, the priest lifts them up and says,

'Holy things for the holy people – ta hagioi tois hagiois – Holy things for the holy people'.

The entire congregation replies,

`One is holy, One is Lord Jesus Christ, to the glory of God the Father'.

We have a similar payer in the Catholic liturgy of the Mass.

Brother Roger (1915–2005) founded an ecumenical monastery in Taizé as a place of prayer, contemplation, fraternity, welcome and peace.

Reflect on his words:

In each person there is a portion of solitude which no human intimacy can ever fill.

Yet you are never alone.

Christ is waiting for you and what you never dared hope for will spring to life.


