SEASON OF CREATION: RESTORING OUR COMMON HOME



Seeing your Life through the Lens of the Gospel

- 1. The healing of the deaf mute provides us with an opportunity to reflect on the importance of communication in our lives. The healing touch of Jesus brought the man from isolation into community. Who have been the people who touched you when you felt isolated and alone (perhaps during the recent lockdown) and helped you to come out of painful aloneness? For whom have you done this?
- 2. Deafness is symbolic of being unable to hear what is being said to us. What a difference when our ears are opened! Perhaps you can recall a time when your ears were opened, and you heard in a new way that you were loved by God or by another person.
- 3. Words are not the only form of communication. Actions can speak louder than words. Recall times when this was brought home to you.
- 4. Being able to say what is in you is the other side of communication. Perhaps there have been occasions when you have struggled to find words to express what is deepest in you your faith, your values, your love. Then something changed and you found the words. What was it like to be able to express your deepest self?

SECOND READING

A reading from the letter of St James 2:1-5



My brothers, do not try to combine faith in Jesus Christ, our glorified Lord, with the making of distinctions between classes of people. Now suppose a man comes into your synagogue, beautifully dressed and with a gold ring on, and at the same time a poor man comes in, in shabby clothes, and you take notice of the well-dressed man, and say, 'Come

this way to the best seats;' then you tell the poor man, 'Stand over there' or 'You can sit on the floor by my foot-rest.' Can't you see that you have used two different standards in your mind, and turned yourselves into judges, and corrupt judges at that?

Listen, my dear brothers: it was those who are poor according to the world that God chose, to be rich in faith and to be the heirs to the kingdom which he promised to those who love him.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark 7:31-



Returning from the district of Tyre, Jesus went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, right through the Decapolis region. And they brought him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they asked him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle. Then looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to

him, 'Ephphatha' that is, 'Be opened' And his ears were opened, and the ligament of his tongue was loosened, and he spoke clearly. And Jesus ordered them to tell no one about it, but the more he insisted, the more widely they published it. Their admiration was unbounded. 'He has done all things well,' they said, 'he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.'

Will a cry wake you from your sleep?

When we have something important to go to the next day, we set our alarm clocks so that we won't miss that flight or an important appointment for which we simply can't afford to sleep in.

I have to admit that as a mother the most effective thing to get me out of bed is the cry of one of my children. It doesn't matter what the time is – I will be sitting upright listening for the type of cry and readying myself for action. You might see this in a playground how even with dozens of children a mother will hear a cry, know when itis her child, and bolt across the playground with the first aid kit of cuddles and plasters to tend to any hurts.

A cry simply cannot be ignored.

But do we ignore cries? Are we ignoring 'the cry of the earth'? Are we ignoring 'the cry of the poor'? Do we roll over and put a pillow over our heads?

We can't pretend that we haven't heard the cry – it fills every newspaper, we've watched the documentaries, our phones ping with breaking news of humanitarian crisis after crisis. The alarm clock on the climate crisis has already sounded and the clock is ticking.

So, what to do?

The first step is always to acknowledge what is happening and our responsibility in being part of the solution. We are all equipped with a first aid kit to heal the earth and to tend to the needs of the poor.

What's in the first aid kit? Our decisions. Everything we do is interconnected.

Each small choice has influence.

Cut the grass or let the bees enjoy the clover?

Cheap food easily wasted or fair-trade food valued?

Scrolling, retweeting, liking posts, or taking the time for genuine advocacy and writing to our MLAs and MPs ensuring that the cry of the earth and the poor don't fall off the political agenda?

Let us set aside time in the Season of Creation for us to marvel at the beauty of the earth that we live in and commit ourselves to restore this common home that we all share. Let us set aside time to be in awe of each human life that God has created and to pray and commit to the possibility of every person living in dignity.

May we be attentive to 'the cry of the earth' and 'the cry of the poor' and may we respond with the love, compassion, and healing that a cry deserves.
