Seeing your Life through the Lens of the Gospel

- 1. The feast we have today, and the gospel, give us an opportunity to reflect on the different ways in which we, and others, exercise influence and leadership. The authority of Pilate came from position and power. The authority of Jesus came from his integrity and what he stood for. Recall leaders you have known whose influence was like that of Jesus (teachers, community leaders, family members).
- **2.** The values of the kingdom of God cannot be imposed. It is never a matter of fighting battles or forcing others into compliance. Perhaps through experience you have learned the limitations of the use of force, as a parent, a teacher, a group leader. What has been the good news, the learnings for you, in this?
- **3.** Jesus came to bear witness to the truth, and we are all created for a purpose. Who are today's witnesses to truth in the world? Who are the people whose witness to truth has impressed you, either now or in the past? In what way have you been able to be a witness to truth? What was it like for you to be such a witness?

The Facts of Death

At some stage when we were children someone took us aside – usually behind closed doors – to explain what were called 'the facts of life'. But some of us don't learn the 'facts of death' until we stand at our parents' graveside – and for this there is no dress rehearsal.

If we are blessed to be granted the time span of our own parents, we will continue to protect our children and we in turn will cradle theirs. But it is still we who are next.

That process of letting go which began at birth is completed at death. There is a freedom granted with the deaths of one's parents and not just from the burden of care – though there is that too – but a freedom to move into a larger space, a freedom I some way to be more fully ourselves. This is perhaps their most important legacy, their last gift, and I am happy to have received it, and not left it unopened, unrecognized at the graveside.

"What a cruel time the pandemic has been for the dying and the bereaved" – Archbishop Eamon Martin

On Sunday 14 November, Archbishop Eamon Martin concelebrated the Mass of Remembrance for those who died during the pandemic in the Basilica of Our Lady of Knock, Co Mayo, in the Archdiocese of Tuam, with bishops and clergy from across Ireland.

During his homily, the Primate of All Ireland said, "We are gathering today to remember all those who died during the Covid-19 pandemic. What a cruel time it has been for the dying and the bereaved.

"Sadly, in many cases during the Covid pandemic, those precious, final moments saw increased heartbreak. At a time when physical closeness is so important, and our caring instinct is to hug someone, or hold their hand, it was distressing that often the final words of love and prayer had to be spoken over a telephone, or from behind windows and screens, or masks or visors."

Drawing attention to the frontline workers fighting Covid. the Archbishop continued, "In a special way today in Knock we remember, with deep gratitude and prayer, the 'heroes' who kept our health, emergency, chaplaincy and other essential services going during the pandemic, often denying themselves in the cause of compassion, charity and love. And they are still doing it, today and every day. "Let society never forget them, and always ensure that our carers and health workers are appreciated, fully resourced and rewarded for their goodness."
